DO YOU SHOP ONLINE?

Join iGive.com to support MACSPRO.



iGive is a free service to causes and members.

iGive really is as simple as it sounds. iGive members can generate donations by shopping at any of their 1,000+ <u>stores</u>. There are no costs, obligations, nor any hidden fees.

SHOPPING: It's all automatic! You don't need to enter any codes, notify the store, or iGive. When iGive members shop via our special links (starting at the **iGive.com** web site, the iGive **Newsletter**, or having installed the **iGive Button**), tracking enables iGive to identify the purchases of each individual iGive member with a member ID number. Causes always receive 100% of the donation amount which is advertised on our web site (iGive.com receives fees separately from the amounts that go to the cause).

You shop the same way as you would without starting at iGive.

When you do start with iGive, stores automatically send the needed information (order amount, order date, and your ID number which identifies the user to iGive.com but is meaningless to the online store) so that iGive can track

the donation to each member's designated cause. When you successfully link to an iGive store, your visit will be immediately visible in the <u>You recently visited</u> box.

You can create your own list of favorite stores under <u>My</u> <u>Stores</u>.

After being reported to iGive, your transactions can be reviewed in your shopping report under <u>Stats</u>. It can take up to 30 days after they've shipped (or travel has commenced) for purchases to get posted to your report, although the average is about 10 days. In-store exchanges may void donations. *Please review any posted store exceptions*.

You have heard the expression: "Let sleeping dogs lie"? There is a reason for that. Think about it.

HEALTH ARTICLE

TAPEWORMS

Tapeworms are long, flat worms that inhabit the intestines and gastrointestinal tract of pets and other "hosts." They do so because tapeworms have no digestive system. Tapeworms vary from less than an inch to several feet in length. The head of the worm fastens to the wall of the gut by hooks and suckers. The body is composed of segments that contain the egg packets. To cure tapeworm infection, the head must be destroyed. If it is not, the worm will regenerate.

The body segments containing the eggs are passed in the feces. Fresh, moist segments are about one-quarter inch (6 mm) long and are capable of moving. Occasionally you may see them crawling through the fur near your dog's anus.

When dry, the tapeworm segments look like rice grains. There is more than one way a dog can get tape worms. They can get it from eating animal's feces, or other little creatures that our dogs may find as a little snack, but the most common way is fleas. That's why it's important to get your dog treated for fleas at least twice a year. If your dog manages to nibble on a flea while trying to relieve the itching it can swallow it and if that flea has a Tapeworm egg inside of it, then it gets embedded into your dog's intestine, where it hatches and lays more eggs. Then you will have a bigger problem than fleas.

Checking for, treating and preventing tapeworms is imperative for ensuring your dog's long-term health. Tapeworms are not contagious just by touch. A person would have to ingest the tapeworm, or eggs, in order to get it.

Treatment:

1. Determine if your pet might have tapeworms. Symptoms of tapeworms in dogs include vomiting, scratching near one's rear and dragging one's rear across the floor. Also, you can check your pet's feces to look for evidence of tapeworms. Tapeworm segments are small, flat and white.

2. Make an appointment with your veterinarian to deworm your pet, as it is the most effective form of treatment. The five primary types of tapeworms in dogs each tend to feature their own kind of specialized treatment. For instance, praziquantel is most commonly used for treating D. Caninum tapeworm, while Drontal Plus is used more often to treat Taenia tapeworms. Your veterinarian

will be able to determine which form of treatment is ideal for your pet.

3. Take precautions to prevent tapeworms. The primary way in which pet owners can prevent fleas and ticks in their dogs is by regular baths and use of a flea comb. thereby lowering the risk of tapeworm infestation.

4. Prevent certain tapeworms from infecting your pet. For instance, don't allow your dog to eat raw meat or prey on wild animals and/or rodents. These raw meats can serve as hosts for tapeworms, which will be transmitted to your dog upon digesting the meat.
